

It's difficult to find a prettier small town than Lowell, Oregon. Accessed by a historic covered bridge, Lowell is nestled at the foot of the Cascade mountains and on the edge of scenic Dexter Lake. The community, established on rolling hills, overlooks the lake where rowers arrive for regattas and fishing boats dot the edges.

Community focus emphasizes access to the outdoors and amenities to improve the quality of life. A trail system project connecting the Pacific Crest Trail (the PCT-to-town connector) and the covered bridge promises to attract hikers from near and far. The City has recently renovated city parks, built a new library and implemented a downtown master plan. At the same time, an Economic Development Committee leads additional initiatives to ensure careful and diverse growth.

- Transportation: Lowell is located across a short bridge span from Highway 58, a major east-west connector, with I-5 just 15 minutes west from town.
- Available space: The community has a privately owned industrial park with business-ready lots. The community is also supportive of home-based businesses.
- Top private employment sectors: Retail, light industrial, food service.
- Communication: Lowell is served by several ISPs relying on fixed wireless, cable, and fiber. It is served by most major wireless carriers.
- Wages: Wages are similar to the surrounding metro area.
- Housing: A mix of luxury and standard homes, and suburban and rural properties, offer a wide range of opportunity. Housing costs are typically lower than the metro area and taxes are lower.


