

Chair Adelman called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

00:02:48 Public Comment

- None

00:02:58 Assignment Review

- Bowen will present the maintenance report. PAC members will elect officers and provide recommendations to fill the vacant PAC position.

00:04:06 Review of Meeting summary

- Approved as written; Mayo motioned, Allen seconded, motion passed unanimously. Ashley noted one change that minutes should reflect she was not present at the last meeting.

00:05:10 Staff Updates

- <u>Facility Condition Assessment Update</u> Henry stated that Faithful & Gould has performed all inventory for the above ground infrastructure. Their subcontractor, Pro Pipe is still working on the below grade infrastructure assessment. Dean Leonard from Faithful & Gould will give a presentation to Parks Funding Task Force (PFTF) at the Feb. 25, 2021 meeting.
- Parks Funding Task Force Update Henry provided the PAC with the packet from the
 previous PFTF meeting and gave an overview of the last meeting. FM3 gave a presentation on
 polling the public to get an understanding of public knowledge of the Lane County Park

system and funding issues. Henry will provide survey questions to the PAC for review. A secondary survey will be done at the end of the year to see if public perception on funding Lane County parks has changed. Christine Moody, Lane County Budget Manager, gave a presentation on how discretionary funds are distributed within the County. Henry will post the PFTF meeting packet online for the PAC to view. The next PFTF is scheduled for February 25th, 2021 and PAC members are invited to attend.

- Holiday Farm Recovery The County and ODOT signed an IGA for debris removal of public and private properties along the McKenzie corridor. ODOT will remove hazardous trees not removed by a contractor hired by McKenzie River Trust. After this process, Parks will receive public assistance from FEMA for the permanent damage to structures. Forest Glen is prioritized as the park to re-open to provide the public access to water and utilize MAP funding for maintenance and repairs. Eagle Rock has the most damage and needs extensive planning prior to re-opening. Henry stated FEMA will be reimbursing for some administrative as well.
- <u>Year in Review Maintenance Report</u> Bowen gave a presentation on accomplishments over the last year including:
 - Started Facilities Condition Assessment at Richardson, Orchard Point, Armitage and Baker Bay.
 - Installed underground power and new host site at Baker Bay.
 - Replaced vault door at Baker Bay.
 - Replaced dump station information board at Baker Bay.
 - New boat ramp and expanded parking at Hendricks Bridge.
 - Installed Hendricks Bridge entrance sign.
 - Stripped day use parking lot at Hendricks Bridge.
 - Installed memorial bench at Hendricks Bridge.
 - Built small Dog Park at Armitage.
 - Painted J shelter at Armitage.
 - Extensive tree trimming at Richardson marina and Orchard Point marina.
 - New metal roofs on both restrooms at Camp Lane.
 - Rebuilt gate at Camp Lane.
 - House, shed and carport remodeled at Camp Lane.
 - New gate installed at Konnie Memorial.
 - Extensive trail maintenance at the North Jetty property.
 - Staff assisted LCAS with moving displaced animals during the McKenzie River Fire.

00:44:43 Old Business

- <u>Election of Officers</u> – Shanley nominates Adelman and Mayo for renewal of their positions. Adelman will serve another year long term as the Chair and Mayo will serve another year long term as Vice Chair. Shanley motioned and Steifbold seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

00:47:00 New Business

- Recommendation of West Lane District PAC Member – PAC members recommended two applicants for Parks to interview. Henry will interview prior to the March meeting and select an applicant to recommend to the Board of County Commissioners.

01:03:12 Open

- Allen reports he is a member of the Climate Equity & Resilience Task Force and is trying to become a liaison between the PAC and the Lane County Climate Action Plan committee. Allen stated that Haley Case-Scott was appointed chair of the Lane County Climate Advisory Committee and will be a good ally for the Florence area and he looks forward to working with her.
- Steifbold would like to know what Parks paid MIG for their help in creating the Parks Master Plan. Henry will look it up and get back to the PAC.
- Mayo inquired about the timeline for reopening Eagle Rock Park. Henry will add item to the agenda for the next meeting. Alverson stated Parks is currently working on hazardous tree removal, then ODOT will come in and perform additional removal.
- Shanley stated most of the buildings were totally burned as well as many trees. Parks is discussing moving buildings to a different location, perhaps away from the river. Shanley stated the area to the East had a lot of tree damage and Parks may be able to extend the grassy area out to increase views of the rock. Stanley stated it is important to consider long-term goals with the park when rebuilding.
- Mayo stated the community up by Eagle Rock is very concerned about the future of the park.
- Henry stated Parks shares the entrance road to Eagle Rock with a private property owner and Parks is considering building a separate entrance road to the Park.
- Adelman stated neighbors of Eagle Rock Park are concerned about the sharp curve at the entrance and the access to the park being quite difficult and would be interested in considering a different access road while considering access for rafters.
- Henry stated the Eagle Rock Parks is currently closed and Parks does not have a caretaker on site and wants to re-evaluate opportunities with the park going forward.

01:15:06 Natural Areas Operations Report

- Alverson presented a document on the natural resource accomplishments for 2020. He highlighted the value of partnerships with groups such as the Friends of Bufford Park, the Arboretum and the Sheriff's mounted posse. Alverson stated the Holiday Farm Fire was a big impact to Parks and the partnerships with McKenzie River Trust, EWEB, the McKenzie Watershed Council, and the Soil and Water Conservation District have provided a great forum for communication in regards to the fire impact and recovery.



Item 1: Provide guidance for countywide GHG reduction plan

The CAC spent time discussing what this might look like. Discussions included using subcommittees to look at specific carbon mitigation areas such as EVs or energy use, setting goals for carbon mitigation, and using the county as conveners in order to get the correct stakeholders to the table. There was also a discussion about education and outreach around climate actions.

Item 2: Carbon sequestration

The CAC discussed how there were so many different stakeholders in this arena and how the county would act to bring them together. The CAC focused on inviting subject matter experts and using that information for outreach and education.

Item 3: Carbon-free housing & utilities

The CAC discussed how the county recently adopted a housing policy and that the County should convene stakeholders to facilitate collaboration. The CAC should think about how to connect people locally to financing and opportunities.

Item 4: Resilience and adaptation

The CAC discussed the importance of engaging the public, both inside and outside of the metro area. The work should identify specific areas/sectors such as forest health and fuel reductions and set goals. It was pointed out that there are overlaps in mitigation, adaptation, resilience, and education. The CAC agreed that it needed to be flexible so it could take advantage of situations that arise.

Document Purpose

This document is designed to document priorities of the Lane County Climate Advisory Committee (CAC) and to be used as a flexible guide for its work. This work plan shall allow for emerging topics of interest as they develop. As the Board of Commissioners requests advise on emerging topics, the CAC is to address such topics in a timely matter whether or not they appear on this work plan. This document also provides background on county goals, plans and actions.

Relevant County Decisions and Background

The Board Order states that Lane County will:

- 1. Conduct a greenhouse gas emissions inventory and develop an internal plan (Climate Action Plan Phase 1) for County operations to establish greenhouse gas reduction targets and implementation plans to meet County targets.
- 2. Develop a comprehensive countywide plan (Climate Action Plan Phase 2) with community engagement to outline aggressive goals and strategies, aligned in partnership with city climate actions, to establish countywide community targets and high priority areas of action.
- 3. Develop a resiliency plan (Climate Action Plan Phase 3) to identify adaptation strategies to mitigate the risks and impacts of climate change anticipated for Lane County.
- 4. Develop Action Initiatives supporting green jobs, clean energy projects, and climate-friendly industries in Lane County.
- 5. Provide open and transparent public communications to monitor and evaluate progress toward climate action goals.
- 6. Establish a Climate Advisory Committee to provide recommendations and advise the Board of Commissioners on the County's ongoing climate action work.







Lane County Parks Natural Areas Operations Report for January and February 2021 - Ed Alverson

- -Holiday Farm Fire: removal of hazardous trees from Lane County Parks has begun; McKenzie River Trust has completed removal of trees that will be used in their upcoming floodplain restoration project. I was on-camera for a KVAL-TV news story on the project on 2/16.Additional coordination is occurring with regular meetings with the Watershed Recovery Stakeholder Group, FEMA, and ODOT representatives.
- -At HBRA I had a site visit with our BLM contact to discuss future BLM-funded fuels management projects.
- -In January we completed the union review process for the Friends of Buford Park 2021 work plan.
- -Parks conditions of approval and finalized the approved Trail 3 project for Friends of Buford Park.
- -I inventoried COVID and other signage at the three HBRA trailheads to help guide stakeholder discussions about signage needs.
- -With Eugene Parks we co-hosted an Americorps NCCC Team for 5 weeks. The Team worked on trails, planting, and invasive species removal projects in HBRA, Zumwalt Park, and Vickery Park.
- -I participated in the 2021 USFWS Prairie Plant Working Group meeting, to discuss progress on recovery of listed plant species, including the endangered Bradshaw's lomatium, which grows at HBRA.
- -I contributed to Bart Johnson's UO Landscape Architecture studio on the topic of "Wildfire Recovery and Resilience" in the Holiday Farm Fire.
- -I made a site visit to Austa Boat Ramp with Mauria Pappagallo from ECS to examine the river bank erosion that has occurred there and discuss options for stabilizing the bank.
- -Other partnership efforts: I participated in more or less weekly meetings of HBRA stakeholders to discuss social distancing in the park and other related Park operations topics. I attended the 1/5 and 2/2 Friends of Buford Park Trails Committee meetings.
